Wende Grove

In the Good Old Summer Time

*In the good old summer time,
In the good old summer time,
Strolling thro' the shady lanes
With your baby mine;
You hold her hand and she holds yours,
And that's a very good sign
That she's your tootsie wootsie
In the good old summer time.*


This chorus from the song of the same name, first published in 1902 with music by George Evans and lyrics by Ben Shields, speaks of a gentler time—a time before large amusement parks, Little League baseball, soccer camp, extensive road trips

and air conditioning. Where in Alden, in the late 1890s or early 1900s, could you find a place for quiet, often romantic walks and boat rides on “crystal” waters, a large swing, even an outdoor bowling lane?

Ralph D. Stowell (1887-1981) said this in one of his “Facts and Foolishness” columns: “In my boyhood, it was called Wende Picnic Grove or Wende Grove, where for years churches, Sunday Schools and other organizations held picnics in the summer. People would come out on the train and get off at Wende Station. There

was boating, bowling and other forms of amusement, and I believe this was all free to the public.” The Grove was the social center for young folks in the early 1900s. It is believed that there was a dance floor because some Millgrovites speak of going to dances there.

Wende Grove or Park was along Ellicott Creek in the vicinity of Walden Avenue (formerly Ellicott Rd.) and Old Wende Road on property owned by the Wende family (near center in map above.) A dam had been built to back up the waters and form a small lake. Ice was cut on this lake in the winter and the

waters were used for the large scoop pans for the steam engines on the Central tracks. A small cabin (photo above) stood on an island in the lake. This cabin is said to have been the seat of the Democratic Party when Otto Wende was County Clerk.



Buffalo newspapers tell of a July 11, 1898, picnic for clerk's office employees and their families held at the Park. A special train car was used to carry the people from Buffalo to Millgrove, although some chose to ride their bicycles. Another picnic for the Alden Edward Eels Post of the G.A.R. was held on the 24th.

Perhaps the best description of an outing at the Grove comes from a 1901 *American Lawyer* publication:

“The Lawyers Club of Buffalo, held its annual outing at Wende’s Grove, a pleasant country spot near Alden, on September 1, and the fact that it was the hottest day of the year did not deter them from having ‘a hot time.’ The use of the grove had been tendered to the legal fraternity by County Clerk Wende, who accompanied the excursionists in the role of Mine Host—a part which he filled most acceptably.

The departure was made by special train over the New York Central, and on reaching Wende Station, the lawyers lined up in columns of fours, and preceded by the Como Band of Lancaster, marched to the grove.

While dinner was making ready, a game of baseball and various other sports were indulged in. The score of the ball game is still a matter of doubt, as the official score keeper gave up his job at a critical moment.

William H. Jaeger, acting as caterer, had provided a most bountiful dinner, and when the gaze of the hungry lawyers fell upon the board, the chairman of the arrangement committee directed the band to play “I’d Leave My Happy House for You.”

After the banquet had been fully discussed, some songs were rendered by soloists Eugene Jerge and W.W. Saperston, the legal lights joining with a strong chorus.

One accident occurred to mar the beauty of the day, James P. Moore, stenographer to Surrogate Marcus, tripped over a mushroom and fell head first into the crystal stream which flows through the grove. Philip Stern lassoed him just as he was sinking for the third time, and hauled him safely to the bank, amid thundering plaudits of the assembled multitude.

Leaving the grove at 6 o’clock, the party stopped in front of Mr. Wende’s home and serenaded him and his family. Then the march to the station resumed, though not in columns of four, and the train was taken for home and Buffalo, where all arrived in good spirits just as the sun went down.”

It appears as though it was not just the food that was bountiful!









When Wende Grove ceased operation is unknown. We do know a farm was located in the area to feed the inmates in the Erie County Penitentiary in Buffalo before the decision was made to relocate the prison outside of Buffalo in 1920. The new Erie County Penitentiary opened in 1923 on what was formerly Wende property.

Wende Grove was not the only railroad excursion park in the area. There was also Taylor Park on land leased by the Erie Railroad on the Darien side of County Line Road. A spur track on the south side provided sufficient siding for the entire excursion train. The 1887 Erie Route pamphlet calls it a "handsome grove containing 30 acres." The Park provided picnic ground and

several recreation areas for swings, croquet grounds, a 100 x 32 foot dance hall and a 100 x 50 foot outdoor dancing platform, half-a-dozen music stands, and arbors. An 1874 *Buffalo Morning Express* article noted that Dr. I.J. Crandall and Mr. Orville Dodge of Alden would have the general management of the place.

Perhaps Taylor Park was the inspiration for Otto Wende to build Wende Grove. One can only speculate.

Magna Carta

800th Anniversary, 1215 - 2015

Alden Woman's Ancestor was Signatory

The earliest seeds of democracy were planted when one of Mrs. Laura Airey's ancestors signed the Magna Carta. Mrs. Airey, resident of Alden, a life member of the Alden Historical Society, gives the following account:

A recent article (April 10th) in the Buffalo News tells of a two week long celebration of the signing in 1215.

Quoting from one of the Buffalo lawyers "If you were to choose one document that served as the basis for democracy and individual rights and people empowering government instead of the king dictating to the people, this would be it."

Thanks to the efforts of my grandmother, she had researched the lineage of our ancestors and found that we are descendants of one of the Barons who signed in 1215. His name was Richard DeClare, the Surety of the Magna Carta Barons. She had listed 30 generations.

Inspiration for Americans

On June 15, 1215, in a field at Runnymede, (England), King John affixed his seal to Magna Carta. Confronted by 40 rebellious barons, he consented to their demands in order to avert civil war.


Magna Carta was written by a group of 13th-century barons to protect their rights and property against a tyrannical king. It is concerned with many practical matters and specific grievances relevant to the feudal system under which they lived.

During the American Revolution, Magna Carta served to inspire and justify action in liberty's defense. The colonists believed they were entitled to the same rights as Englishmen, rights guaranteed in Magna Carta. They embedded those rights into the laws of their states and later into the Constitution and Bill of Rights.

The Fifth Amendment to the Constitution ("no person shall . . . be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.") is a direct descendent of Magna Carta's guarantee of proceedings according to the "law of the land."







Pledge of Allegiance Address by Gil Dussault
Alden Historical Society Golden Anniversary Dinner
Sat. May 30, 2015



It can be a very emotional experience to see our beloved US Flag waving proudly in the breeze. Hearts seem to beat a bit faster, lumps grow in our throats and the welling of tears is a common

occurrence. When we consider what The Stars N Stripes, Old Glory, or the Star Spangled Banner stands for...we find that it has served for many in our nation as an inspiration for courage, duty, service and sacrifice.

In 1892 Rev. Francis Bellamy, a Baptist Minister, composed the original Pledge of Allegiance. Based on his personal beliefs, he gave us the great exclamation, declaration and affirmation of the loyalty and patriotism we hold for this great nation of ours. It is an expression of allegiance to the Flag of the United States and the Republic of the United States of America.

The Pledge was formally adopted by Congress in Wartime 1942 and the Official Name was adopted in 1945. Revised a few times.....the last change in language came about on Flag Day 1954 when the words "Under God" were added. For years it has been commonly recited in schools at the beginning of every school day. Congress opens with the Pledge, as do many government meetings at local levels, and meetings held

Strawberry Social and 1965 in Review




