Reflections of Alden



The long awaited book, *Reflections of Alden*, will be available at a book signing reception on Sunday, February 26, 2012, from 2-6 pm, at the Alden Historical Society, 13213 Broadway, Alden. The book is the result of a collaborative project of the Alden Middle School, the Alden Art Club and the Alden Historical Society. The project was funded by a grant from the E&WG Foundation, The book features colorful paintings done by students and local artists of various buildings and places, with corresponding articles written by Society members, that tell the story of

Alden. A special, very limited, hard cover edition will be available for \$45 and a soft-cover, spiral-bound edition will be available for \$25. Proceeds from the sale of the book will be used for the Society's educational programming. A portion of the proceeds will be donated to local charitable organizations.

In connection with the release of the book, there will be a special display featuring some of the paintings, along with relating artifacts and ephemera, at the Society building until April 30.

CENTURY HOUSE 13277 IRVING STREET ALDEN, NY The following account is by owners Tom and Jennifer Cantie.



Our home at 13277 Irving St. in the Village of Alden is an anomaly for a village full of Colonial and Victorian style architecture. The house in an English Tudor that was built in 1890; however, it was not originally designed in this style. We soon came to discover the reason for these differences because the house has a unique history.

When built, it was actually a smaller Victorian, but then Katherine Steinfeldt purchased the house and transformed it in 1930 into an English Tudor. Interestingly, the former

Mayor of Lancaster during that era and a later delegate to the New York State Senate (1896-1910), George A. Davis, owned a Tudor mansion in Lancaster on the corner of Broadway and Central Ave. By 1930, the mansion was being torn down to pave the way for Standard Oil to build the first gas station in Lancaster.

According to the Lancaster Historical Society, pieces of the mansion were auctioned off locally before its demolition, and it was Katherine Steinfeldt who purchased the red Medina sandstone, giant gothic doors, and dozens of leaded glass windows from Davis' home to create her Tudor here in Alden. It is rumored that this heavy load was actually pulled all the way down Broadway by horse-drawn carts. We do possess a copy of an old photo of the original Davis mansion. Not only has the house become a Century Home of Alden, but we are fascinated that it also preserves a piece of history that has vanished.

The Lives It Has Touched

We have met people over the years whose families had lived in the Tudor over the decades. The Stutzman family lived here with their seven children during the 1960s and put an addition on the back. One of the daughters stopped by one day in 2004 and we took her inside to see the house again. She broke down and cried as she relived her childhood memories and gave us some of the history behind its unusual features.

The House Today

Tom and I have always marveled at how the grandeur of this house has endured throughout the century. It is a real testament to the artistic vision and dedication that Katherine Steinfeldt possessed in creating a landmark that has withstood the test of time. In fact, her name appears on the back of the custom-made crown molding and baseboards throughout the house. This house preserves her legacy as well as the memories of all those families that have lived in it thereafter. For Tom and myself, it is a poignant notion to think that this home will outlive our own family, but we realize that it will always house the cherished times we have spent here.

<u>The Whistle Stop Inn and Other Businesses</u> <u>Corner of Railroad and Exchange Streets</u>



We met "on site" for the October 2011 program meeting, at the Whistle Stop Inn at 1338 Exchange Street. Kelly Cavanaugh, daughter of owners Doug and Terry Becker, presented the first part of the program detailing the history of the establishment. Kelly, with help from curator Karen Muchow, had researched the building for a Christmas present for her father. A hotel has been on that site since the Erie Railroad came through in 1843. It has changed names— Swyers Hotel, Kuhn's Hotel, the Depot Hotel—and owners over the years. The building has burned and been rebuilt a couple of times. When it was rebuilt in 1934 after a fire, bowling alleys were added.

Another fire destroyed parts of the alleys. The remnants can still be seen in the floor of the dining room.

Kelly's grandparents, Ona and Oliver Becker, purchased the Inn in 1964. Today, Kelly and her husband Patrick, along with her brother Jon, help Doug and Terry run and operate the restaurant and catering service.

Karen then gave a brief history of other businesses in that area. The Erie Depot, across the tracks from the Whistle Stop, was once a busy place with a number of trains each day delivering not only goods, but also patrons of Alden's famous Blackwater Baths. The depot closed in 1963. The building still stands, now being used as the Wood Depot. Next to the depot was Patterson's Hotel and livery. A bathhouse was added to the hotel in 1908 to capture some of the Black Water Bath trade. The name was changed to the Alden Mineral Baths and Hotel. It was called the Empire Hotel in 1949 when it was destroyed by fire on Christmas Eve. It was never rebuilt. Today, located to the rear of the site, is the Blackwater Fitness Club.

On the southeast corner of the intersection stood a general store. One of Alden's first pharmacists was located there. William Pfeil operated a store on the site and later built his Beanery behind the store. The Beanery stood empty for a number of years before it burned in 1992.

Back across the tracks, in what is now a private home, was Young's Laundry. Behind the laundry was the Alden Veneer Manufacturing Co, operated by the Savage family. They made a variety of baskets.

Thank you Kelly and Karen for a very informative evening and thank you Doug and Terry for allowing us

to meet at your restaurant and for the hospitality you provided us.

Christmas Tree Farm



Mr. Bill Weber; owner and operator of Weber's Tree Farm, Alden, NY, presented the December 2011 program at the Alden Community Center. Mr. Weber gave a detailed account of what takes place from the time a seedling is planted in the ground to the time the tree is harvested some 10 to 12 years later. He brought in twig samples and cones of the various coniferous trees most commonly used as Christmas trees and explained many of the difficulties regarding tree farming. These include the effects that insects, deer, rabbits, mice, fungus and weather may have on the crop. Care for the trees requires "a labor of love" since the trees may require fertilizer, pesticides, pruning, staking and grass

mowing and the timing for doing many of these things is very important. This was a very informative presentation with many questions and answers that followed.

After the Christmas tree program, Mr. Conrad Borucki announced the results of his Christmas "favorite and least favorite" survey which was completed during the November program.

Thank you Bill for a very informative program. We wish you well for many more years of Christmas tree harvesting.

Also thank you Courad for the Christmas "favorite and least favorite" survey with some very surprising results.
