



RABIES FACTS:

- **RABIES is 100% fatal once symptoms occur & 100% preventable with rabies shots.**



- BATS, RACCOONS, SKUNKS & FOXES are the 4 warm blooded animals that are presumed to have Rabies in New York State and must be avoided.
- Laboratory testing of the suspect rabid animal can be done to determine if the animal is infected with the RABIES virus.

- **814 ANIMALS TESTED POSITIVE FOR RABIES IN ERIE COUNTY, NY FROM 1990-2017.**
- The animals that have tested positive for Rabies in the last 28 years are: 451 raccoons, 218 bats, 85 skunks, 25 foxes, 20 cats, 6 woodchuck, 3 cattle, 1 sheep, 3 deer, 1 beaver and 1 dog.
- If your pet is not vaccinated for Rabies and is involved with a presumed rabid animal that is not available for testing, it must be quarantined for a period of six months or euthanized.
- All dogs, cats and domesticated ferrets are required to be vaccinated for Rabies as per New York State Public Health Law: Section 2141 to protect people and pets from getting rabies.
- If you are feeding a feral cat, you are the owner and are responsible for that cat's care and Rabies vaccination.



- **Erie County Health Department's Rabies, Disease & Vector Control Program conducts FREE RABIES CLINICS EVERY YEAR.** 81,579 rabies vaccinations were given at these clinics from 1998-2017.
