# PROPOSED MINUTES REGULAR MEETING OF THE

### BUFFALO & ERIE COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES April 19, 2018

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library (B&ECPL) was held on Thursday, April 19, 2018, at the Central Library pursuant to due notice to trustees. The following members were present:

Chair Frank Housh called the meeting to order at 4:03 p.m. in the Joseph B. Rounds Conference Room. A quorum was present.

Agenda Item B – Approval/ Changes to the Agenda. Chair Housh entertained a motion to amend the agenda to add executive session during New Business in order to discuss public safety. Trustee Bedenko moved, Trustee Panty provided the second, and the motion carried.

Agenda Item C - Minutes of the Meeting of March 15, 2018. On motion by Trustee Panty, with a second by Trustee Gist, the Minutes were approved as corrected.

Agenda Item D – Report of the Chair. Chair Housh shared Team Housh's Heroes were the champions for the second year in a row of the West Seneca Public Library's annual Team Trivia/ Basket Raffle fundraiser. Over \$1,500 was raised for various items to be purchased for the new West Seneca Public Library building.

Chair Housh conveyed the good news of the 2018-2019 New York State (NYS) Budget, sharing it via Facebook, and deferred discussion until the Report of the Director.

Trustees were reminded the May 17, 2018 B& ECPL Board of Trustees meeting will take place at the North Park Branch Library.

Agenda Item E - Committee Reports.

Agenda Item E.1 – Executive Committee. The April 12<sup>th</sup> Executive Committee Meeting Report was at each trustee's place. Chair Housh summarized the meeting and requested the written report be entered into the Minutes. Trustee Bedenko moved, Trustee Amodeo made a second, and approval was unanimous.

Present: Executive Committee Chair Frank Housh, Committee members Sheldon Berlow, Kathleen Berens Bucki and Dr. Rhonda Ricks. Also present were Trustees Ted Johnson and Elaine Panty, Library Director Mary Jean Jakubowski and Deputy Director - Chief Financial Officer (CFO) Kenneth Stone.

The meeting of the Executive Committee began at 4:05 p.m. in the Joseph B. Round's Conference Room of the Central Library. A quorum was present.

Chair Housh reviewed the proposed agenda for the April 19, 2018 meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Director Jakubowski spoke to the proposed resolution to approve New York State Annual Reports. Discussion ensued. CFO Stone described the financial component of the Reports.

CFO Stone spoke about the recently passed 2018 – 2019 State Budget. Trustee Berlow asked about continued advocacy and asked if there was a role that local Foundations could have in garnering ongoing support. Chair Housh described the budget process and the positive, albeit slow, progressive success of advocacy for libraries by staff, trustees, patrons and Friends Groups. Director Jakubowski indicated the challenge comes from the Governor's proposals and not that of the State delegation, who have received and understand the message that "libraries are education" and thus demonstrated such by providing increased support. Director Jakubowski also spoke to the efforts of the New York Library Association (NYLA). Discussion continued.

Trustee Johnson requested an update on the status of the Library Foundation of Buffalo & Erie County. Discussion ensued. Director Jakubowski noted she has researched information on memorandums of understanding between public libraries and supporting foundations, per the request of Trustee Wayne Wisbaum, Chair of the Development and Advocacy Committee, and subsequently has provided him a document for discussion by the Development

and Advocacy Committee. She also noted the document has been reviewed by the B& ECPL's attorneys, who have suggested the document be used as the impetus "to getting a conversation started." Director Jakubowski reminded the Executive Committee the Board needs to solidify what they want from the Foundation and how they wish to frame the relationship between the organizations. Discussion ensued. Director Jakubowski will follow up with Trustee Wisbaum.

Chair Housh spoke to the Lackawanna Public Library Organizational Review and the proposed resolution being brought forth regarding determination of the Review.

There being no further business, the Executive Committee meeting adjourned at 4:41 p.m. on a motion by Trustee Bucki, second by Trustee Berlow.

Trustee Ricks arrived at 4:15 p.m.

Agenda Item E.2 – Budget and Finance Committee. Deputy Director CFO Kenneth Stone thanked everyone for advocating for the increases in State Library Aid and Library Construction Aid received in the 2018-2019 NYS Budget as detailed in the written Report of the Director (Agenda Item F).

Agenda Item E.2.a – Approve New York State Annual Reports. Deputy Director Chief Operating Officer Jeannine Doyle explained this resolution approves the New York State Annual Reports for 2017. She shared some of the impressive highlights from the report which included: an overall programming increase (specifically a 25% increase in attendance at children's programs, an overall increase in attendance of summer programs, a nearly 30% increase in early literacy sessions, a 208% increase in adult literacy programs, and a 179% increase in adult programs offered for English Speakers of Other Languages), a 12% increase in electronic materials use, and an increase of 24% in the B& ECPL's electronic materials collection. Trustee Bucki moved for approval of Resolution 2018-5 as presented; Trustee Panty made a second, and approval was unanimous. Director Jakubowski shall submit the reports to the NYS Department of Education.

#### **RESOLUTION 2018-5**

WHEREAS, the Library System Basic Aid, Local Library Services Aid (LLSA), Local Services Support Aid (LSSA), Central Library Book Aid (CLBA), Central Library Development Aid (CLDA), Coordinated Outreach Library Services Aid, State Correctional Facilities Aid and Services to County Jails (Interinstitutional) Aid are annual New York State statutory aid programs aimed at assisting library systems, central libraries and local libraries in developing collections and providing services to their constituents, and have provided significant funding for many years, and

WHEREAS, in order to maintain the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library's (B&ECPL) charter as well as qualify for State Aid funds, each library files reports annually with New York State Library's Division of Library Development (DLD) summarizing achievements, activity and financial performance, and

WHEREAS, the B& ECPL files both a Public Library Report and a Library System Report, while each contracting member library also files a Public Library Report, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the B& ECPL Board of Trustees assures that the B& ECPL "Annual Report for Public and Association Libraries – 2017" has been reviewed and accepted and that the Library operated under its Plan of Service in accordance with the provisions of Education Law and the Regulations of the Commissioner, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the B& ECPL Board of Trustees assures that the Library System operated under its approved Plan of Service in accordance with the provisions of Education Law and the Regulations of the Commissioner, and assures that this "Annual Report for Library Systems – 2017" has been reviewed and accepted, and be it finally

RESOLVED, that the B& ECPL Board of Trustees assures that the B& ECPL System will be operating under its approved Plan of Service in accordance with the provisions of Education Law and the Regulations of the Commissioner and assures that the "Budget Summary" has been reviewed and accepted.

Agenda Item F – Report of the Director. Copies of the annual Conflict of Interest Appendix A – Disclosure Statements completed by each System Trustee and B&ECPL Key Employee for the year 2018 were given to Alan Bedenko, Chair of the Governance Committee, per the B&ECPL Conflict of Interest Policy, Article III, Section 3.2 – Annual Disclosure.

Director Jakubowski invited everyone to join her Friday, April 20th, for the annual Books for Kids campaign at Wegmans on Sheridan Drive from 5 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Handouts were at each trustee's place for a B& ECPL fundraiser taking place at the Alex and Ani store in Williamsville on April 29th from 3 – 5 p.m.

Trustees were reminded that it is not too late to purchase tickets for the April 21st B& ECPL fundraiser Library Night with the Buffalo Bandits beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Following the Board meeting, beginning at 6 p.m., trustees were invited to a program consisting of a series of 10 minute original plays by local actors/ actresses inspired by the B& ECPL's Buffalo Never Fails: The Queen City and World War I exhibit, based on specific artifacts from the exhibit.

A Policy Committee meeting will take place Wednesday, April 25<sup>th</sup> at 4 p.m. at the Central Library. Director Jakubowski updated trustees that a meeting of the Development and Advocacy Committee is being arranged which will discuss a document she created in hopes it will be the first step towards a memorandum of understanding between the Library Foundation of Buffalo & Erie County and the B&ECPL.

Congratulations were extended to Trustee Elaine Panty who celebrated a significant birthday this month. At a private celebration in her honor, in lieu of gifts, guests were asked to make donations to the Riverside Branch Library in her name; over \$500 has been received to date. Director Jakubowski extended heartfelt thanks on behalf of the B&ECPL.

A sincere thank you to all staff at all libraries for the tremendous work they did throughout the past year, as reflected in the NYS Annual Reports, was expressed by Director Jakubowski.

The following was submitted by the Director and transmitted to Board members prior to the meeting:

#### B& ECPL Monthly Report March 2018

State Budget: On March 30th, the New York State Legislature passed an on-time budget for the fiscal year beginning April 1st. The Legislature's support for libraries was reflected in the enacted budget, which featured the first increase in State Library Aid since 2016 and a significant boost to Library Construction Aid.

The enacted 2018-19 New York State Budget increases State Library Aid by 1.05% (from \$95.6 million to \$96.6 million – an increase of \$1 million). Further, funding for the Library Construction Aid program increased nearly 42% (from \$24 million to \$34 million – an increase of \$10 million statewide).

For the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library (B&ECPL), the enacted budget translates into an increase of approximately \$23,000 in aid for the operating budget and \$7,000 in recurring grants bringing the combined total to over \$2.9 million. The share of Construction Aid available for projects proposed by B&ECPL and its member libraries is estimated to increase approximately \$458,000 to over \$1.5 million.

Letters recognizing our appreciation for the budget increases have been sent to New York State Senators and Assemblymembers representing B& ECPL libraries.

Celebrating Women's History Month: Women's History Month was inaugurated for the 9th year in ceremonials at the Central Library hosted by Karen King, PhD, Executive Director of the Erie County Commission on the Status of Women. The new March 2018 calendar promoting 40 Women's History Month-themed activities across Erie County, coordinated by Community Engagement Manager Anne Conable, was introduced. Several programs were hosted at the Central Library including 2 Women's Ways Peace Ways panel discussion programs by the WNY Peace Center (March 16th and 23rd), the Roses for Outstanding Women awards program presented by Eva Doyle (March 3rd), and a talk by architect Kelly Hayes McAlonie on Clever Women: Innovators of Buffalo's Golden Age (March 29th). The annual Woman of Courage, Compassion & Commitment award was presented to former Erie County Legislator Betty Jean Grant.

New Rare Book Exhibit Opens: The Rare Book Room opened its new exhibit Omar Khayyám's Rubáiyát: The Persian Poem That Became a Sensation in English Translation. This exhibit tells how a 12<sup>th</sup> century Persian poem that was translated into English in the 19<sup>th</sup> century took the Western world by storm! Early and significant, finely bound, fine press editions, along with the finest illustrated examples are shown in this exhibit.

The Rubáiyát follows the very popular Building Buffalo: Buildings from Books, Books from Buildings exhibit which closed on March 26<sup>th</sup>. The exhibit was seen by nearly 10,100 visitors from around the world.

Chairman's Book Club: Held on March 9th, the Chairman's Book Club was guest hosted by Karen King, PhD, Executive Director of the Erie County Commission on the Status of Women. Panelists Sara Vescio and Hilary Vandenbark discussed Rebecca Solnit's essay compilation Men Explain Things to Me. The next Chairman's Book Club will be held May 11th when panelists will discuss Hillbilly Elegy: A Memoir of a Family and Culture in Crisis by J. D. Vance.

Winter Reading Contests Conclude: Information Services and Outreach Librarian Melissa Blattner brought the Adult Online Winter Reading Contest to conclusion, awarding a Kindle Fire HD to a lucky participant from the Aurora Town Public Library. Readers submitted book reviews which were posted to the Library's website. Eightynine participants submitted 794 book reviews.

The 2018 Kids, Teen and Classroom Online Winter Reading Contest also concluded with 11 teens (ages 12-16) reading and reviewing 155 books and 62 "kids" (ages 5-11) reading and reviewing 301 books. Grand prize winners representing the Crane Branch Library and the Elma Public Library each received an Amazon Kindle. Three classrooms registered with 51 students reading 72 books. The winner of an Amazon gift card and various books and crafts was the Kinder-Ready Room at Brierwood Child Care from Hamburg. Children's Services Librarian Jennifer Lelinski coordinated the Kids, Teen and Classroom Contest.

India Association of Buffalo: On Saturday, March 31st, volunteers from the India Association of Buffalo visited the Central Library's Technical Services Department to finish the work of organizing and translating books donated by the Consulate General of India, New York. Titles that highlight India's rich heritage were selected for the Clarence Public Library, the Amherst Public Library - Audubon Branch, as well as the Central Library. Technical Services Manager Jennifer Childs and Assistant Deputy Director Maureen McLaughlin assisted the group. The collections will also include newly purchased titles identified with the help of Association member Akruti Babaria. A celebration of culture will be held at the Audubon Branch Library on Saturday, May 12th. Information will be posted to the B& ECPL website.

Bobinski Lecture: Part of the Bobinski Lecture Series, the B& ECPL co-sponsored the March 14th lecture arranged by the UB Department of Library and Information Studies. The program, Library and Information Matters: A Local-Global View of Diversity, examined how diversity in libraries needs to be addressed on both a local, user-community level, and also in the context of global exchange. The presentation detailed how libraries influence and are shaped by systems/ notions of power that determine whose voices are represented, who has access to opportunities, and whose cultures are sustained; Director Mary Jean Jakubowski, Buffalo Branches Manager Linda Rizzo, amongst others attended.

#### Highlights:

- March 1st Library Associate Sean Goodrich and Children's Services Librarian Steve Clancy staffed an information table at STEAM Night at Parkdale Elementary School in East Aurora, spreading the word about the services offered at the Launch Pad and demonstrating equipment at the event, including Osmo, Ozobots, a VR headset and the button maker. A total of 174 children and parents visited the table.
- March 3<sup>rd</sup> Information Services and Outreach Librarians Shanley Olszowy and Sandra Courtney organized the Non-Profit Series @your Library. March 3<sup>rd</sup>, speaker Gwen Curry presented Starting a Non-Profit Organization to 55 participants at the Central Library. The workshop focused on defining what a non-profit is, how to start a non-profit organization, fundraising, grants and strategic planning. The second part of the series was held March 17<sup>th</sup> at the Central Library's TechKnow Lab. Individuals were introduced to the resources offered through the B& ECPL System. Shanley conducted 2 workshops reviewing resources from the Foundation Directory Online and the Grants and Grant Writing for Not-For-Profits subject guide, which showed attendees how to find funding, partners and further develop their strategic plans.

Page 10 March 3<sup>rd</sup> - Children's Services Manager Kathryn Galvin and Information Services Page Brittany Book visited Buffalo Public School 80 Highgate Heights as part of their Saturday Academy. Participants created a tissue paper collage and were provided with information about the Library. III March 4th - Children's Services Librarian Erin Burke and Children's Services Senior Page Sally Schaefer provided pre-concert activities for the BPO Kids performance of Peter and the Wolf. Children were invited to make Peter and the Wolf scenes from Ellison cutouts, and everyone was encouraged to take stickers, bookmarks, and library fliers. About 135 people stopped by the library's table. March 6th and 17th – Kathryn Galvin conducted an Educator Preview of the Buffalo Never Fails: The Queen City and World War I exhibit, including an abbreviated version of the program From World War I Propaganda to Today's Fake News. March 7th – Information Services and Outreach Librarian Renée Masters represented B&ECPL at a Wellness Fair organized by Buffalo Public School 192 Buffalo A cademy for the Visual and Performing Arts. Renée interacted with 200+ fifth through twelfth grade students who were very interested in library resources. March 13th – Dudley Branch Library hosted the Rince Na Tiarna Irish Dancers. Every year, Dudley has the Irish dancers perform in the main section of the library. The dancers perform a variety of traditional Irish dances and go over their history as well. A total of 84 patrons were in attendance. March 14th – Renée Masters and Erie County Health Department – Public Health Educator Kelly Fletcher planned and participated in Wellness Wednesdays -Colon Cancer: Debunking the myths. Folks from the Erie County Cancer Services program were on hand to provide information about health habits that decrease the risk of colon cancer and the importance of screening. A nutritionist from Eat Smart New York provided information about a fiber-rich diet, helpful in reducing cancer risk. In all, over 40 visitors stopped by the event to receive health information. March 14<sup>th</sup> – Legislator April N.M. Baskin hosted a community round table discussion of public safety and criminal justice issues at the Frank E. Merriweather, Jr. Branch Library. March 17th – Jennifer Lelinski and Brittany Book visited Buffalo Public School 80 Highgate Heights as part of their Saturday Academy. Participants were able

to make a shamrock wreath in honor of St. Patrick's Day.

Children made "Libraries Rock!" buttons. March 24th – Librarian Rhonda Konig presented Breaking Old World: Finding Foreign Places of Birth in American Records at the Western New York Genealogical Society meeting that was held at the Central Library's Ring of Knowledge. Over 50 people attended this meeting. March 24th - Children's Services Librarian Wanda Collins and Media Room Senior Page Alexandria Meranto hosted a craft and information table at Buffalo Public School 3 D'Youville Porter Campus School's Saturday Academy program. Children enjoyed making a pan flute out of straws, and parents were given information about upcoming library programs as well as library card applications. March 27th – Renée Masters facilitated and presented a program on customer service in the public library for students and faculty from the Olmsted Center for Sight, Statler Center, a program that instructs physically disabled, blind or visually impaired individuals with career-based skills needed to achieve competitive wage career employment. Receptionist Ashley Ligammari and Development Manager Maureen Germaine also shared how their departments enhance hospitality for both internal and external customers. ⊞ March – A total of 12 offsite Book a Librarian sessions were conducted at Medaille College's library during the Small Business Administration's Straight Talk Series. Reference USA Business/ Consumer Lifestyle, Business Insight Essential, and Small Business Resource Center sessions were conducted. Many expressed how valuable and helpful the business plans from the Small Business Resource Center were and participants of the Consumer Life Style sessions were impressed with strategies to identify target markets and demographics for their



WHEREAS, the B&ECPL Director is satisfied with the Lackawanna Public Library Board of Trustees' corrective actions and recommends to the B&ECPL Board of Trustees the Organizational Review be recognized as complete, with periodic monitoring by the B&ECPL in the areas of personnel scheduling, work assignments, hours of operation and petty cash reimbursements, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the B& ECPL agrees the Organizational Review of the Lackawanna Public Library is complete, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the B& ECPL requests the Library Director, or her designee, to periodically monitor personnel schedules, work assignments, hours of operation and petty cash reimbursements at the Lackawanna Public Library.
