Initiatives for a Smart Economy 1.0 – Close-out Reports

In January of 2018, departmental staff provided close-out reports on the 64 initiatives comprising Initiatives for a Smart Economy 1.0 for the time period of January, 2017 – December, 2017. This memo will summarize the annual reports as well as highlight the overall performance of the economic plan as reporting comes to a close.

Please refer to the attached spreadsheet for a complete listing of the initiatives and the status of each. A full compilation of the reports is also available for your review.

Completed Initiatives

To date, 44 initiatives have been fully completed (up from 32 at time of the previous reporting period), representing 69% of the total, including recently completed initiatives 3.11, which called for the construction of a new academic building at ECC, 4.31, which called for the acquisition of land on the old Bethlehem Steel site to allow for the redevelopment of the property, and 3.21, which established a fund to allow municipal members of the Erie County Community Development Consortium to apply for funding for smart growth projects in and around their central business districts.

In Progress Initiatives

Seventeen of the remaining 20 initiatives are in progress. Eight of the in-progress initiatives are at least 70% complete, which should lead to a significant number of the remaining initiatives being completed over the next year.

Please see the attached spreadsheet for notes on individual projects, including a summary of the current status of each project by initiative supervisors. Initiatives that have shown measurable progress or movement from one phase to a new phase are highlighted in yellow.

Initiatives Not Yet Begun

Three initiatives have not yet begun, representing 5% of the total. However, two of the three initiatives not yet begun have been included in the Poloncarz administration's new economic development plan, Initiatives for a Smart Economy 2.0: Focus on Inclusion, which was released in June 2017.

Conclusion

Of the 64 initiatives, a total of 61 (94%) are completed or in progress. Substantial progress has been made since the last report in January 2017 and further progress is expected over the next year.

Despite this being the final report for Initiatives for a Smart Economy 1.0, the administration will continue to monitor the progress of the remaining initiatives. As stated above, some of the initiatives not yet complete have been included in the new economic plan, Initiatives for a Smart Economy 2.0. Reporting on these initiatives will begin in the coming months and the Legislature will be provided with a progress summary upon completion of the first reporting period.

The fund was created to allow municipalities, who are members of the Erie County Community Development Consortium, to apply for funding for smart growth projects in and around their central business district areas. The Village of Springville completed phase I and II of smart growth projects on Franklin and Mechanic Streets and by Factory Street. Roads were reconfigured to allow for increased pedestrian traffic to Main Street and their central business district and a creation of a new park area at Factory which is located adjacent to Main Street. A total of \$750,000 in CDBG funds were expended for both projects. The full project amount for both phases of the project was \$1,457,000. The City of Tonawanda completed an intermodal HUB smart growth project. This project involved improvements to the deteriorated public parking lot behind Main Street and their central pusiness district. The improvements centered around the construction of a new HUB building that houses restrooms, blke racks, showers and penches. A total of \$325,000 in CDBG funds were expended for this project. The full project amount was \$1,130,000.
