A LOCAL LAW amending Local Law No. 1 - 1959, constituting the Erie County Charter, as amended, in relation to the composition of the county legislative districts.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** Sections 105 and 106 of Article I of Local Law No. 1-1959, and Section 201 of Article II of Local Law No. 1-1959, constituting the Erie County Charter, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE I  
 ERIE COUNTY AND ITS GOVERNMENT

Section 105. Legislative Districts. The County of Erie is hereby divided into seventeen districts, bounded and described as follows:

COMMENCING at the intersection of the north line of the Town of Cheektowaga and Montfort Drive; thence easterly with all its meanderings along the north line of the Town of Cheektowaga to the east line of the Town of Cheektowaga; thence southerly along the east line of the Town of Cheektowaga to the north line of the Incorporated Village of Depew; thence westerly along the north line of the Incorporated Village of Depew to Sable Palm Drive; thence southerly along the center line of Sable Palm Drive to George Urban Boulevard; thence westerly along the center line of George Urban Boulevard to Dick Road; thence northwesterly along the center line of Dick Road to its intersection with the West Shore Railroad line; thence northeasterly along the West Shore Railroad line to its intersection with Stanislaus Avenue; thence southerly along the center line of Stanislaus Avenue to Poinciana Parkway; thence easterly along the center line of Poinciana Parkway to Sable Palm Drive; thence northerly along the center line of Sable Palm Drive to its intersection with the rear north lot line of Crandon Boulevard; thence easterly along the rear north lot line of Crandon Boulevard to its intersection with the rear east lot line of Satinwood Drive; thence northerly along the rear east lot line of Satinwood Drive to its intersection with Genesee Street; thence southwestwesterly along the center line of Genesee Street to Cayuga Road; thence northerly along the center line of Cayuga Road to Cleveland Drive; thence westerly along the center line of Cleveland Drive to Princeton Avenue; thence southerly along the center line of Princeton Avenue to Greenway Boulevard; thence northwesterly along the center line of Greenway Boulevard to Farmingdale Road; thence southerly, westerly and northwesterly along the center line of Farmingdale Road to Fairhaven Drive; thence southwestwesterly along the center line of Fairhaven Drive to Union Road; thence northerly along the center line of Union Road to Cleveland Drive; thence southeasterly along the center line of Cleveland Drive to Montfort Drive; thence northerly along the center line of Montfort Drive to the point or place of beginning.

**District No.16**

All of the Towns of Clarence and Newstead.

ALSO, all that portion of the Town of Amherst bounded and enclosed in the following description:

COMMENCING at the intersection of Hopkins Road and North French Road; thence northerly along the center line of Hopkins Road to the north line of the Town of Amherst; thence northerly and easterly along the north line of the Town of Amherst with all its meanderings to the east line of the Town of Amherst; thence southerly along the east line of the Town of Amherst to its intersection with the rear south lot line of Fennec Lane extended in a straight line to the east line of the Town of Amherst; thence westerly along said extended rear south lot line of Fennec Lane to Paradise Road; thence northerly along the center line of Paradise Road to the Town of Amherst Right-of-Way; thence westerly along the Town of Amherst Right-of-Way to Youngs Road; thence northerly along the center line of Youngs Road extended to Dodge Road; thence northeasterly along the center line of Dodge Road to North French Road; thence westerly along the center line of North French Road to the point or place of beginning.

ALSO, All that portion of the Town of Lancaster bounded and enclosed in the following description:

COMMENCING at the intersection of the west line of the Town of Lancaster with the north line of the Town of Lancaster; thence easterly along the north line of the Town of Lancaster to the east line of the Town of Lancaster; thence southerly along the east line of the Town of Lancaster to Erie Road; thence westerly along the center line of Erie Road to Ransom Road; thence southerly along the center line of Ransom Road to Broadway; thence westerly along the center line of Broadway to east line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster; thence northerly along the east line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster to the north line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster; thence southwesterly along the north line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster to the east line of the Incorporated Village of Depew; thence northerly along the east line of the Incorporated Village of Depew to the north line of the Incorporated Village of Depew; thence westerly along the various meanderings of the north line of the Incorporated Village of Depew to the west line of the Town of Lancaster; thence northerly along the west line of the Town of Lancaster to the point or place of beginning.

**District No. 17**

All of the Towns of Alden, Concord, Holland, Marilla, Sardinia and Wales.

Also, all that portion of the Town of Lancaster bounded and enclosed in the following description:

COMMENCING at the intersection of the west line of the Town of Lancaster with the south line of the Incorporated Village of Depew; thence southerly along the west line of the Town of Lancaster to the south line of the Town of Lancaster; thence easterly along the south line of the Town of Lancaster to the east line of the Town of Lancaster; thence northerly along the east line of the Town of Lancaster to Erie Road; thence westerly along the center line of Erie Road to Ransom Road; thence southerly along the center line of Ransom Road to Broadway; thence westerly along the center line of Broadway to the east line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster; thence northerly along the east line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster to the north line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster; thence southwesterly along the north line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster to the west line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster; thence southerly along the east line of the Incorporated Village of Lancaster to its intersection with Spohn Drive being a southwest corner of the Incorporated Village of Depew; thence westerly along the meandering south line of the Incorporated Village of Depew to the point or place of beginning.

Section 106. Legislative Districts, continued. The seventeen legislative districts as previously bounded and described by Local Law No. 2 – 1991, shall continue as such for the limited purpose of continuing in office the legislators presently elected from said districts and shall cease to exist as such on January 1, 2002. For the purpose of the general election of 2001 and all other purposes, except as herein before provided, the county of Erie is divided into seventeen districts, bounded and described as contained in section one hundred five herein.

ARTICLE II  
LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

Section 201. County legislature constituted. The county legislature shall be composed of seventeen members who shall be elected one from each of the seventeen legislative districts set forth in section one hundred five hereof. The county legislators representing the seventeen districts herein created when lawfully convened shall constitute the county legislature which shall be the legislative and governing body of the county.

**Section 2.** If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or article of this shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such determination shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence,

paragraph, section or article thereof directly involved in the proceeding in which such adjudication shall have been rendered.

**Section 3.** The Clerk of the Erie County Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to cause a copy of the foregoing Local Law to be published in the county's Official Newspapers.

**Section 4.** This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the New York State Municipal Home Rule Law.
