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
Down by the Old Mill Stream

In Alden, that “mill stream” would have been either Cayuga Creek or Eleven Mile (Ellicott) Creek, the two major creeks in the town; Cayuga in the southern portion, Ellicott in the central part.

Mills, especially saw mills as they were easier to build, were among the first industries in the new settlements after the purchase of land from the Holland Land Company. John C. Rogers is said to have built the first mill in the Town of Alden, a saw mill, on Ellicott Creek in 1814, and then in 1817, a grist mill at the intersection of what is now Sandridge Road and North Road. Nathan Willis and John Webster settled on the main road to Buffalo (Broadway) just east of the hamlet of Town Line about 1812 and both subsequently built saw mills on Cayuga Creek.

Moses Case moved from Onondaga County in 1817 and built the first house in Mill Grove. He is credited for naming the hamlet for the half dozen or so grist mills and saw mills in the area.

A close examination of the 1866 Stone and Stewart Atlas map of Alden shows several mills along Cayuga Creek. Nathan Chesebro operated a grist mill near the intersection of Cary Road and Three Rod Road. Further west along the creek, near Four Rod Road, was a saw mill operated by Festus Tenney (Town of Alden Supervisor in 1858). Near Two Rod Road was another saw mill, and then farther west, near Townline Road, were the sawmills of Willis and Webster.

In Alden Center, along Ellicott Creek, was the grist mill built by John Rogers. It had been sold to Warren and Sylvester Earl, who subsequently sold it to Charles M. Platt in 1847. He ran it until his death in 1875, then his wife and son ran it.

A saw mill is shown further north along the creek and appears to be on the property of D. Suttle. This may have been John Rogers' first mill. Herman Wende built a saw mill along the creek in 1850 in the area known as Wende Station, a small settlement along the N.Y. Central tracks.



West of the hamlet of Millgrove, near the intersection of Zoeller Road and Genesee Street, was the grist mill owned by William Rearick. In the hamlet itself there appears to be two mills along a tributary of Ellicott Creek, just north of Genesee Street. Another saw mill is shown on Buckwheat Road.

Earl Duttweiler, who at the age of 81 wrote a two-part article on "Millgrove Memories" for the *Alden Advertiser* in 1972, mentioned that there must have been a mill just north of the Millgrove Creamery that stood where Ward Hydraulics machine shop started, because there was a stone wall of a dam behind a bunch of trees and brush. That would have been one of the mills mentioned above and shown on an 1880 map of Millgrove.

Not all mills in Alden were by the old mill streams. In 1850, John Edson built a steam sawmill in Crittenden where he sawed a large portion of the plank to build the Buffalo & Batavia plank road, a toll road completed in 1852. The sawmill was destroyed by fire two or three years later.

H. Perry Smith in his 1884 History of Buffalo and Erie County lists a saw mill in the Village of Alden. The 1880 map of the Village shows a steam saw mill owned by Allen Eastwood on the north side of Railroad Street near Elm Street.

By 1914 the only mill standing was the one at Sandridge and North. The dam was washed out in 1915 but the mill had already been converted to steam power, and later to gasoline. Fred Sievenpiper of Millgrove remembered his father having grist ground there with stone mill wheels. The mill burned about 1922 in the biggest fire Fred said he had ever seen.



With the modern machinery of today, mills no longer need to be near a source of water power. No more old mill streams, just memories.

Learning about Forest Lawn Cemetery

Interest in the memories and stories associated with Forest Lawn Cemetery is high, as indicated by the turnout for the January 12 Alden Historical Society program “Forest Lawn Cemetery and the Rural Cemetery Movement.” Sandy Starks, Interpretive Program Director of Forest Lawn, shared an abundance of facts and stories about many of the more than 165,000 persons interred in our regional, historic cemetery jewel. Established in 1849, Forest Lawn was part of



the rural cemetery movement intended to prevent the spread of disease by locating burial grounds away from population centers. At the time of its development, Forest Lawn was located on farmland that was especially selected for the beauty of its landscape. Forest Lawn offers guided walking tours, trolley tours, concerts, lectures, and archives for genealogical exploration. Wildlife, picturesque landscape, art, architecture, and the performing arts all enhance the Forest Lawn experience.

Mystery Surrounds Amelia Earhart

Amelia Earhart's life and disappearance was the subject of the February 9 Alden Historical Society program presented by Greg Kinal, regional educator and speaker on historical topics. Mr. Kinal began by sharing background



on Amelia's life and flying history leading up to her 1937 attempt to be the first female to circumnavigate the earth. Setting out from Miami in June, she and navigator Fred Noonan were more than 20,000 miles into their 29,000 mile journey when all contact with them ceased. Kinal shared two theories regarding the fate of Earhart and Noonan. Researchers Elgen Long's theory purports that Eleanor, out of fuel,



crashed and sank her Lockheed Model 10E Electra when she attempted a water landing in three miles ocean depth and Ric Gillespie's theory posits that Earhart and Noonan, unable to locate Howland Island, the next destination on their journey, continued on an errant navigational line until landing at uninhabited Gardner Island, later renamed Nikumaroro, 350 nautical miles from Howland Island. There are varying bits of evidence, including radio transmissions, supporting the theory that they landed at Nikumaroro and survived as castaways for a few days, but there is no conclusive proof. For now, the mystery remains.


Come and Enjoy these New Programs

JUNE 8 A TRIBUTE TO FLAG DAY—GEORGE McGAUGHEY In September 2013, former Aldenite and Social Studies teacher George McGaughey entertained and informed our Historical Society audience with his program on Gettysburg. Revolutionary War Veterans

Alden Town and Village Historian Karen Muchow has brought to the attention of the Historical Society the interment of several Revolutionary War veterans in local cemeteries: five vets in the Evergreen Cemetery and two in the Town Cemetery on Sandridge Road. Historical Society Secretary Jennifer Strong has contacted the local DAR (Daughters of the American Revolution) and SAR (Sons of the American Revolution) for assistance with obtaining replacement grave markers identifying the vets' Revolutionary War service. The DAR could assist us, but the bulk of the cost for the markers would have to be borne by our organization. The markers could be attached to the gravestones to discourage theft. However, some of the gravestones are in poor condition and may not be capable of supporting a marker. Secretary Strong reported that two of the graves have no headstones. The Veterans Administration would provide headstones, but the Historical Society would have to pick up the cost of their installation.

Donations toward these expenses would be greatly appreciated. Should you wish to make a donation, please indicate Rev. War vets in the check memo line.

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

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
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MISSION STATEMENT
