Gypsies In Alden?

The late Larry Kocher introduced me to the online site Newspapers.com. He had used it when working on the Kocher genealogy, and I have found it invaluable in my research into happenings and events in Alden over the years. It was during one of my Alden searches that I came across this rather sad article from the March 31, 1915, issue of the *Buffalo Evening News*:

Baby Gypsy Dies of Exposure; Women Are in Sad Plight

ALDEN, March 31—(Special).—Nicholas Steve, son of George Steve, one of a band of Brazilian gypsies, in camp a mile and a half from here, died from pneumonia and exposure. The child was four years old and was brought to Alden for burial by Undertaker A.E. Frantz. The interment was in the Alden cemetery.

The band was overtaken by a storm and the women are in a pitiful condition. Women of Alden contributed clothes and did what they could for their relief.

Little Nicholas's death certificate is in the file in the Town Clerk's office, but no place of burial is listed. My assumption is that it was most likely the Alden Town Cemetery on Sandridge Rd. and Nicholas lies in an unmarked grave.

What is remarkable (but maybe not for Alden) is the response of the women of Alden to the plight of the gypsy women. This was not the usual way gypsies were treated.



Gypsies are an ethnic group of people called Roma that originated in India and then spread throughout Europe around 1,500 years ago. In fact, the term Gypsy is considered derogatory. Think of the term "gyp" when applied to a person's handling of a transaction.

The Roma have been discriminated in Europe for centuries where they were portrayed as cunning outsiders who stole from local residents before moving on to the next town. Their itinerant lifestyle was looked upon with scorn. That discrimination continued when the Roma emigrated to the United States around 1860.

The newspapers of the late 1800s and early 1900s are filled with articles telling of communities driving the gypsies away. One article tells of a band of gypsies from New York on its way to Chicago who set up camp near North Tonawanda and was driven out of the camp by the police on Christmas Eve into Erie County. There they settled near Buffalo where their tents were demolished by blizzard winds, so the entire band of thirty-two-- 6 men, 5 women and 21 children-- plus 16 horses lived in one tent.

Besides the unsanitary conditions of their camps that caused concern for communities were the instances of alleged thievery, including the kidnapping of children. The gypsies did make money by buying and selling and trading horses, and by “telling fortunes”. This enabled them to travel around the country, living outdoors during the warm months, and in cities during winter. In time, their brightly decorated wagons gave way to automobiles.

And now a personal note. My grandmother died following childbirth when my mother was only three. The baby, named Bertha after her mother, was adopted by Fred and Mary Zoeller of Millgrove. Mary was my mother’s aunt. Another aunt and her husband, Laura and Ernest Siehl, took my mother to raise, but my grandfather refused to let them adopt her. The older four siblings stayed with their father in Buffalo.

My mother was raised on the Siehl farm on Siehl Road in Crittenden. When she was six, she began school in the red brick schoolhouse on Crittenden Rd. in the hamlet. In the winter her uncle took her to school and back on the bobsled, but in the spring and early summer she walked home after school, about a mile and a half.



The following incident happened sometime between 1915 and the Siehl’s move to the Milliman house in the village in August 1919. My mother was on her way home from school one day when two cars of gypsies pulled alongside on the road. She was near the Crittenden Creamery (on the present Stone property) so ran inside, and the owner, Mr. Smith, hid her in his office. Several of the gypsies came in and looked all around, and when they couldn’t find her, they left and drove away. She was scared to death, but Mr. Smith talked to her and telephoned the farm. Her uncle came to pick her up. Writing about this incident at age 68, she said, “I have never forgotten that experience.”


Were the gypsies really going to kidnap her? She and Mr. Smith thought so, and acted accordingly. Were gypsies given a bad rap like so many other immigrant groups, or were the allegations against them true? Many unanswered questions.

At least in Alden, little Nicholas Steve was given a proper burial and the women of his camp were treated kindly by the women of Alden.

Curator’s Corner

Once a year the Alden Historical Society displays a rare and unusual item from our collection. The 19th century German carousel was donated to the Society by the Marjorie Rohl family in 1989. Marjorie was a home economics teacher at Alden Central High School. Her mother-in-law Mabel Rohl, was given the carousel as a child by her uncle. It is believed that the toy was purchased at S.O. Barnum and Sons in Buffalo. There



are five dolls included in the carousel that are dressed as soldiers with metal epaulettes and swords.

Each soldier rides in a carriage made of wood. The sides are cut into a general horse shape and covered with decoupage carousel horses. The base contains a music box. Playing the music box allows the entire carousel to turn quite rapidly.

The Rohl family brought the toy out only at Christmastime. It is quite large when set up and would have taken up a lot of space in a small living room. Because it was only used once a year, the toy has remained in fairly good condition. In 2002-2003 the toy was cleaned and repaired by the Art Conservation Department of the State University College at Buffalo. The department packed the carousel in archival boxes to protect them.



It is my hope that you were able to see the carousel at the Heritage Center on December 19th. This treasure is now packed away until next year. Happy New Year to you all.



The Alden Chamber of Commerce was organized to actively support business, industry, institutions, organizations and individuals in an effort to enhance the quality of life for the residents of the Village and Town of Alden.

Formed in 1956, the Alden Chamber of Commerce originally sought out doctors for the community and established medical services for the Town. The Industrial Park was purchased and started by the Chamber for new businesses to come to the community. They initiated and worked to get the Alden Medical Center and purchased the original Christmas decorations in the Village.

Over the past 65 years, the Chamber has supported numerous community events and developed programs to support and develop business in Alden, such as: the Taste of Alden, Wine tasting (with portion of proceeds to benefit a non-profit), Citizen/Business of the Year, awarding two scholarships (to two Alden graduates), produced last two Alden Phone Books, yearly Christmas ornaments and residential and business lighting contest, Christmas in the Park and the Farmers' Market.

Board Elects 2022 Officers and Resets Committees





Fish Toast



One cupful of any flaked cold fish. Heat in one cupful of cream, adding salt, butter and cayenne pepper. When hot pour over thin slices of buttered toast; garnish with eggs poached in milk instead of water. Nice for breakfast or luncheon.

Macaroni and Cheese

One-fourth pound of macaroni broken in small pieces. Pour over it three pints of boiling water. Let boil about 25 minutes or until soft. Drain in a colander, pour cold water over to cleanse and keep it from sticking together.



Cream Sauce—One and one-half cupfuls of hot milk, a tablespoon of butter and flour rubbed together and added to the milk, and one cupful of grated cheese. Pour into a pan alternating layers of macaroni and sauce, with crumbs over the top. Bake 25 minutes. Tomatoes can be used in place of cheese.

Oil Dressing for Lobster or Shrimp Salad



Beat the yolks of two eggs until very light, then add olive oil drop by drop, beating mixture until it is stiff. Add one and one-half teaspoons of salt, one-half teaspoon of mustard, a dash of red pepper and the juice of one lemon. After adding these beat oil into dressing until stiff. Be sure to have the oil ice cold. For either lobster or shrimp salad have as much celery as fish, and mix dressing with it just before salad is to be served.

Whip one pint of cream until stiff, add one cup of cold coffee, one cup of sugar, one-half pound of chopped nuts. Dissolve sugar in coffee before it is added in the cream, pack in a freezer and freeze as you do mousse. This will serve six persons, serve in sherbet or parfait glasses.

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
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
