A RESOLUTION SUBMITTED BY LEGISLATORS CHIMERA, HARDWICK, BASKIN, MEYERS. GILMOUR, JOHNSON AND VINAL

Re: Support for Municipal Recycling Programs and Manufacturer Responsibility for Recycling

WHEREAS, most municipalities in Erie County have a 20-year tradition of engaging in municipal recycling programs to help reduce the use of landfills, reduce costs to the taxpayers, and to support earth-friendly practices; and

WHEREAS, recycling programs deliver environmental benefits, including waste reduction, conservation of precious natural resources and reduced greenhouse gas emissions; and

WHEREAS, New York residents place three billion pounds of newspapers, magazines, cardboard boxes, plastic bottles and metal cans out for recycling each year; and

WHEREAS, plastic containers, plastic film, glass bottles, cans, catalogs and cardboard make up more than 40% of the solid waste stream in the US; and

WHEREAS, starting in 2017, municipal governments have begun to experience problems with recycling programs, with many leaders stating that recycling partners in China have been unable to, or declined to continue to accept recycling materials; and

WHEREAS, separate from the problem with Chinese partners declining to accept recycled items, the economics and financial costs of curbside recyclables is generally insufficient to cover the costs of sorting and processing the recyclables, thus leading to new costs and financial burdens to local governments; and

WHEREAS, municipalities that were once selling recyclable materials at a profit are now paying to dispose of their recyclables, with the expected cost in 2021 for New York's municipalities approaching \$80 million, and \$5.7 million in Erie County; and

WHEREAS, due to the new and growing costs to municipalities, and the refusal of partners to accept recyclables, many recyclables are ending up in landfills or incinerators, with an estimate of 40,000 tons of recyclable materials being trashed annually in Erie County; and

WHEREAS, as more Americans rely on shopping from home and have consumer items shipped to their homes, there is a growing segment of the waste sector made up of paper, cardboard and plastic packaging; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Senate and New York State Assembly have introduced legislation, the Extended Producer Responsibility Act (Senate Bill S.1185A and Assembly Bill A.5801) that would require manufacturers to cover the cost of recycling their product packaging and paper and to invest in modernizing the operations at local recycling facilities; and

WHEREAS, this state legislation shifts costs from taxpayers, reduces waste and negative environmental consequences, and provides an incentive for producers to create less packaging and to make packaging easier to recycle and without toxic chemicals; and

WHEREAS, consumer product brand-owners that control the type and quantity of their packaging would be required to pay for the municipal collection and processing of their product packaging and recyclable printed paper, as well as costs to educate the public about how to properly recycle; and

WHEREAS, requiring corporate producers to financially contribute the end-of-life costs for their products will help municipalities sustain local recycling; and

WHEREAS, Citizens Campaign for the Environment has noted that while New York could be the first state in the US to adopt this policy, it has been in effect in parts of Europe and Canada for decades; and

WHEREAS, the state legislation would help to reduce municipal costs to taxpayers while supporting municipal recycling programs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature expresses its support for the Extended Producer Responsibility Act (Senate Bill S.1185A and Assembly Bill A.5801) to assist municipal governments with the costs and burdens of recycling programs and urges its passage and adoption into law; and be it further

RESOLVED, that Erie County, which has a long tradition of supporting recycling and environmental initiatives, expresses our support for local governments and their recycling programs and encourages them to express support for Senate Bill S.1185A and Assembly Bill A.5801 and to working together and with the County in cooperative measures to support recycling and reducing costs to taxpayers; and be it further

RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution be transmitted to the Erie County delegation of the New York State Legislature, to the Governor, to the New York State Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Conservation, to the County Executive, and to the Erie County Commissioner of Environment and Planning.

AN ACT to amend the environmental conservation law, in relation to establishing the extended producer responsibility act

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

- Section 1. Legislative intent. The legislature finds the weight of 2 waste generated in New York is a threat to the environment. The legisla-3 ture further finds and declares that it is in the public interest of the 4 state of New York for covered material and product producers to under-5 take the responsibility for the development and implementation of strat-6 egies to promote recycling, reuse and recovery of covered material and 7 products through investments in the end-of-product-life management of 9 § 2. Article 27 of the environmental conservation law is amended by
- 10 adding a new title 31 to read as follows:

- 3. "Curbside recycling" means a recycling program that serves single 10 and multi-family residential units, schools, state or local agencies, or
- 11 institutions that is operated by a municipality pursuant to a contract 12 with the municipality, private entity, or other public agency or through
- 13 approved local solid waste management plans.
- 4. "Post-consumer recycled content" means the content of a product
- 15 made of recycled materials derived from post-consumer recycled materials 16 or feedstock.
- 5. "Producer" means: (a) the person who manufactures the covered mate-18 rial or product under such person's own name or brand and who sells or
- 19 offers for sale the covered material or product in the state; or
- (b) the person who imports the covered material or product as owner or licensee of a trademark or brand under which the covered mate-
- 22 <u>rial or product is sold or distributed in the state; or</u>
- (c) the person or company that offers for sale, sells, or distributes 24 the covered material or product in the state.
- 25 A producer shall not include a municipality or a local government 26 planning unit.
- 27 6. "Producer responsibility organization" means a not-for-profit
- organization designated by a group of producers to act as an agent on
- 29 behalf of each producer to develop and implement a producer responsibil-30 ity plan.
- "Readily-recyclable" means packaging that can be sorted by entities

- 1. Within three years after the effective date of this title, no
- 6 producer shall sell, offer for sale, or distribute covered materials or 7 products for use in New York unless the producer, or a producer respon-
- 8 sibility organization acting as their designated agent, has a producer
- 9 responsibility plan approved by the department. Producers may satisfy
- 10 participation obligations individually or jointly with other producers
- 11 or through a producer responsibility organization.
- Within one year after the department approves a producer responsi-
- 13 bility plan, producers shall be required to meet the minimum post-con-
- 14 <u>sumer recycled material content rate and minimum recycling rate for a</u>
- 15 covered material or product as approved by the department in the produc-16 <u>er responsibility plan.</u>
- 3. A producer shall be exempt from the requirements of this title if 17 18 the producer:
- (a) Generates less than one million dollars in annual revenues;
- (b) Generates less than one ton of covered materials or products 20
- 21 supplied to New York state residents per year; or
- (c) Operates as a single point of retail sale and is not supplied or
- 23 operated as part of a franchise.
- 4. Retailers that are not producers are exempt from the requirements 24

- 5. Producers may comply individually or may form a producer responsi-
- 27 bility organization and discharge their responsibilities to such organ-

- 29 § 27-3105. Funding mechanism.
- 30 1. A producer responsibility organization shall establish program
- 31 participation charges for producers through the producer responsibility
- 32 plan pursuant to section 27-3107 of this title which shall be sufficient
- 33 to cover all program costs.
- 2. A producer responsibility organization shall structure program
- 35 charges to provide producers with financial incentives, to reward waste
- 36 reduction and recycling compatibility innovations and practices, and to
- 37 discourage designs or practices that increase costs of managing the
- 38 products. The producer responsibility organization may adjust charges to
- 39 be paid by participating producers based on factors that affect system
- 40 costs. At a minimum, charges shall be variable based on:
- (a) Costs to provide curbside collection or other level of consumer
- 42 service that is, at minimum, as convenient as curbside collection or as
- 43 convenient as the previous waste collection schema in the particular
- 44 jurisdiction;
- (b) Costs to process a producer's covered materials or products for 45
- 46 sale to secondary material markets;
- (c) Whether the covered material or product would typically be recycl-
- 48 able except that as a consequence of the product's design, the product
- 49 has the effect of disrupting recycling processes or the product includes
- 50 labels, inks, and adhesives containing heavy metals or other hazardous
- 51 waste as defined by the department in regulations that would contaminate
- 52 <u>the recycling process</u>:
- (d) Whether the covered materials or product are nonfood contact
- containers and other nonfood contact packaging that is specifically
 - designed to be reusable or refillable and has high reuse or refill rate.

- 3. The charges shall be adjusted based upon the percentage of postconsumer recycled material content and such percentage of post-consumer
 recycled content shall be verified either by the producer responsibility
 organization or by an independent party designated by the department to
 ensure that such percentage exceeds the minimum requirements in the
 covered material, as long as the recycled content does not disrupt the
 potential for future recycling.
- 4. A producer responsibility organization shall be responsible for calculating and dispersing activity-based costs for municipal services utilized by a producer responsibility organization if the municipality elects to be compensated by the producer responsibility organization in the recovery, recycling, and processing of covered materials, whether such services are provided directly by the municipality or through a contracted service provider. The activity-based cost mechanism shall be based on the cost of residential curbside collection, on-site processing cost for each readily-recyclable material, cost of non-readily recyclable material type, and any other cost factors as determined by the department. To facilitate the producer responsibility organization's determination of the cost of recycling, participating municipalities shall report data related to their costs and the value of materials to the producer responsibility organization. Cost calculations shall take into consid-
- 5. The department shall make such rules and regulations which may be necessary for a producer responsibility organization to develop and manage a funding mechanism and activity-based costs.

Producers, or a producer responsibility organization acting as their designated agent, shall develop and submit a producer responsibility plan to the department no later than one year after the effective date of this title. Such plan shall be for five years and shall be reviewed and updated every five years following the approval of the plan to be reviewed or revised prior to the five year period if the department has cause to believe the minimum post-consumer recycled material content rates, minimum recycling rates, or other factors of the plan are not being met or followed by the producer, or producer responsibility organization, or if there has been a change in circumstances that warrants revision of the plan. The submitted plan shall include, but not be limited to:
- 41 (a) contact information of the producer responsibility organization
 42 and the producer or producers covered under the plan;
- 43 (b) a description of how comments of stakeholders were considered in 44 the development of the plan;
- 45 (c) the covered materials for which the producer or producer responsi-46 bility organization is responsible for;

- 31 ing collection and can be effectively sorted by the facilities receiving
- 32 the curbside collected material;
- 3. The provider of the residential curbside recycling service agrees 33
- 34 to include the category of covered materials and products as an accepted
- 35 material;
- 4. The covered materials and products category is not handled through 36
- 37 a deposit and return scheme or buy back system that relies on a
- 38 collection system other than curbside or multi-family collection; and
- 5. The provider of the residential curbside recycling service agrees
- 40 to the producer responsibility organization activity-based
- arrangement.

- 1. The producer, or producer responsibility organization, shall
- 44 provide effective outreach, education, and communications to consumers
- 45 throughout New York state regarding:
- (a) proper end-of-life management of covered products and beverage 46

- 49 opportunities;
- (c) how to prevent litter of covered products and beverage containers; 50

- (d) recycling and composting instructions that are: consistent state-

- laws and processing capabilities; easy to understand; and easily acces-54

- 1 2. The outreach and education required pursuant to subdivision one of 2 this section shall:

SUMMARY

It is recommended that the Legislature approve the attached resolution prepared by the Erie County Department of Environment and Planning (ECDEP) authorizing the County Executive or Deputy County Executive to execute necessary agreements to enter into a one-year agreement to accept \$85,623.00 in funding from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for a Municipal Waste Reduction Recycling (MWRR) grant; sign Memorandums of Understanding with Erie County's Local Solid Waste Management Boards; accept \$20,250.00 in funding from the Local Solid Waste Management Boards representing 42 municipalities in Erie County; contract with sub-awardee Recycle Coach; establish a program budget; and fund one existing Senior Environmental Compliance Specialist (JG-12) staff position.

These sources of funding, as well as funding designated as grant match in Erie County's 2021 budget, will allow the ECDEP to continue to provide waste reduction and recycling education and outreach programs for county residents, and administrative, logistical and technical support services to assist regulated municipalities in Erie County through the two local solid waste management boards for 2021.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The NYSDEC grant provides 50% of the funding for the waste reduction and recycling education and outreach programs in Erie County. The Local Solid Waste Management Boards engage ECDEP for assistance and in return provide funding that is used as part of the local match to the existing NYSDEC MWRR one-year grant program. The County also provides match dollars as a county share.

Each Board is also responsible for Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) costs above the County contribution for these events.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Approval of this resolution will enable the ECDEP to continue to provide waste reduction and recycling education and outreach programs for Erie County residents and essential services to 42 municipalities served by Erie County's two Local Solid Waste Management Boards. Each Board has a Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP) approved by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC). Each SWMP contains various requirements that need to be addressed by to reduce solid waste generation and increase recycling rates. These

requirements must be met for each member municipality to have the authority to collect and dispose of residential generated solid waste.

The MOU's outline a scope of services to be provided by ECDEP and provides funding to offset expenses associated with the ECDEP commitment.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Without the requested authorization, Erie County will be unable to provide waste reduction and recycling outreach and education programs to Erie County residents and assist its 42 municipalities to meet the objectives set forth in the Solid Waste Management Plans. The solid waste boards would need to hire an outside consultant in order to receive the services now provided by Erie County.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The necessary contracts with NYSDEC, sub-awardee Recycle Coach, and a Memorandum of Understanding with each Local Solid Waste Management Board will be executed by the County Executive or Deputy County Executive. A program budget will be established and a current employee will fill the position.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

There will be no additional impact on County resources. The program expenses will be funded by the NYSDEC grant and the required match will be met with in kind labor using existing DEP staff and project partners for needed support.

The Erie County Department Environment and Planning (DEP), through the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), has been awarded \$200,000 to support the Erie County Food Waste Reduction Project. While a part-time position was authorized in the resolution, the position type was not specified at that time.

Erie County and its partners, Northeast Waste Management Officials' Association (NEWMOA) and State University of New York (SUNY) Erie Culinary Department, are implementing a food

reduction project focused on reducing food waste in commercial kitchens through tracking, measuring, and planning using LEANPATH technology and training. Erie County Medical Center, Buffalo General Hospital, Millard Fillmore Suburban Hospital and HighPointe on Michigan will participate in the project.

The food waste reduction program will provide needed experience and data for the implementation of the Food Donation and Food Scraps Recycling Law, with enforcement scheduled for January 2022. The law applies to commercial establishments that generate an average two tons or more per week of food waste and would require the establishment to divert the food waste from landfill and arrange for donation and/or recycling of the food waste.

Job duties will include working with partners, gathering and analyzing data and creating education and outreach materials and events to inform businesses about food waste donation and recycling opportunities and requirement in Erie County.

SUMMARY

This resolution is seeking authorization for the County Executive to accept Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and New York State Emergency Management Office (SEMO) aid funding and reimbursements concerning the storm surge and seiche that occurred on October 31, 2019, DR 4472, and specific to the Isle View Park Dock, PW 205. It is also seeking authorization for the County Executive to execute design and construction contracts as necessary for projects authorized by FEMA within project amounts so authorized.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The Federal share of the FEMA approved project costs is 75% and New York State has agreed to fund 50% of the remaining non-federal share, with the remainder to be funded by the County.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

To allow the County to accept FEMA and SEMO aid reimbursements for FEMA approved project DR 4472, PW 205, as well as to allow timely contracting for design and construction services related to FEMA approved project DR 4472, PW 205 within the project amounts so authorized by FEMA.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On October 31, 2019, we experienced a Lake Erie seiche event spurring a seven-foot increase in water levels along the many parts of the Lake Erie shoreline. Two properties owned or maintained by Erie County Parks were significantly damaged: Times Beach Nature Preserve and Isle View Park. Both locations became eligible for federal funding with an official disaster declaration by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in December 2019, designated as DR 4472. At Isle View Park the existing dock was completely removed from its pylons and washed away down river. This funding was allocated for the rebuilding of the dock to include improvements to help it withstand future high water events.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The County will be unable to accept Federal or State funds in connection with work related to DR 4472 and will also be unable to contract in a timely fashion for necessary design and construction services.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The County Executive will be able to accept Federal and State aid reimbursements for FEMA approved work related to DR 4472, PW 205 and will be able to contract in a timely fashion for design and construction work necessary to complete such approved work.

Location: The 255 Ship Canal property (Site) is located on 20.35 acres within the Buffalo Lakeside Commerce Park, in the southwestern section of the City of Buffalo. The site is located in the eastern section of the Buffalo Lakeside Commerce Park, created in the early 2000¿s to facilitate the redevelopment and productive reuse of former industrial properties that existed along the Union Ship Canal (¿the Canal¿). The site is located east of the Canal. The Canal was reportedly constructed in the early 1900s, with excavation beginning in or about 1903. The area around the Canal was formerly occupied by the operations and facilities of the Hanna Furnace Corporation, a producer of pig iron from approximately 1903/19-4 until 1982. The site is identified as Erie County Tax Parcel 132.20-1-16. This parcel is a compilation of portions of other prior tax parcels that were subdivided and/or reconfigured with the creation of the Buffalo Lakeside Commerce Park. The northern portion (approximately two-thirds) of the site consists of the southern portion of the former Shenango Steel Mold property. This area historically contained the southeastern approximately one-half of the former Shenango cast iron ingot mold plant from approximately 1963 until 1982. Prior to 1963, this area was reportedly part of the area owned and operated by Hanna Furnace Corporation. The southern remainder of the site is comprised of land that was previously associated with the Hanna Furnace Company. This area previously contained the Hanna Furnace waste water treatment plant, numerous rail spurs, and reportedly received slag and other waste materials from the Hanna operations. Site Features: The Site is relatively flat and situated at an elevation of approximately 860 feet above mean sea level. The site is presently vacant and largely overgrown by weeds, shrubs, and trees. Remnants of gravel access roads/drives extend through various areas of the site, and a majority of the surface soils at the Site appeared to consist of non-native soils, including slag material (various colors) and former rail bedding (black). Large piles and berms (consisting of concrete, stone, and soil) are located in the central and eastern portions of the Site. Solid waste has been dumped on the site, primarily adjacent to access roads that cross the site. The waste items appear to have been discarded to the ground surface, and include various scrap metal and wood items, tires, construction / building debris, and roofing shingles. Additionally, smaller piles of soil were also observed on the site, apparently dumped and/or remnant of previous operations at the site. The site and surrounding properties are served by or will be served by municipal water and sewer services in the event of future development. Current Zoning and Land Use: The Site and surrounding parcels within the Buffalo Lakeside Commerce Park are currently zoned D-IL (Light Industrial). The proposed use is consistent with current zoning and comparable to adjacent properties to the north and south that have been developed since the inception of the Commerce Park. Past

Use of the Site: The Site is presently vacant, but was historically developed with a portion of a cast iron ingot production facility operated by Shenango Incorporated from approximately 1963 through 1982. The ingot facility received molten iron from blast furnaces operated at that time on the southwesterly adjacent site that previously contained the operations of the Hanna Furnace Corporation. Prior to 1963, the property was part of the larger Hanna Furnace Corporation operations that encompassed the entire area surrounding the Union Ship Canal. The southern portion of the site historically contained a waste water treatment facility and numerous rail spurs associated with the Hanna Furnace Corporation blast furnace operations. The Shenango plant closed in 1982. Building demolition and salvage operations reportedly occurred there in the early 1990s; however, documentation and information related to these activities is limited. In 1993, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) received an anonymous tip indicating that oil had been released to the ground surface from electrical transformers during salvage operations. Following investigation, NYSDEC determined that an emergency removal action was warranted to address an imminent threat to public health and the environment posed by high concentrations of polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) found in the transformer oil and affected soil. Several phases of investigation were subsequently conducted by NYSDEC under the New York State Superfund Program. A remedial action was conducted on the former Shenango Mold site (northern portion of proposed BCP site) in 2006 to remove soils having elevated concentrations of PCBs located near the south side of the former Shenango plant, and to address an area on the eastern portion of the former Shenango site where light non-aqueous phase liquid (LNAPL) had been identified on the surface of groundwater. The contaminants summarized below have been identified to remain at the site following the remedial action. Site Geology and Hydrogeology: The Site is location in the Erie Lowland physiographic province of New York, and is positioned at an elevation of approximately 580 feet above mean sea level. The surface topography of the Site is relatively flat, while the overall topography of the surrounding area slopes gently toward the west, in the direction of Lake Erie. The eastern shore of Lake Erie is located approximately one-half mile to the west of the site. Several large (in many cases as much as 10 ¿ 15 feet in height) piles of material of unknown origin have been deposited across the surface of the site. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) has mapped the surface soil across the subject property as 'Urban Land¿. The term 'Urban Land¿ indicates that a significant portion of the property is covered by impervious surface (i.e., buildings, pavement), or that soil has been significantly altered by past development activities. According to the Surficial Geologic Map of New York ¿ Niagara Sheet (Donald H. Cadwell, 1988), the overburden deposits at and in the vicinity of the site consist of lacustrine silt and clay, described as ¿generally laminated silt and clay deposited in proglacial lakes, generally calcareous,

thickness variable (up to 100 meters) ¿. According to Geologic Map of New York ¿ Niagara Sheet (Lawrence V. Rickard and Donald W. Fisher, March 1970), the bedrock in the area of the Site is mapped as Skaneateles Formation Levanna Shale and Stafford Limestone of the Hamilton Group. Geologic and hydrogeologic conditions on the site were also characterized during a Remedial Investigation performed by Environmental Resources Management (ERM) and described in ERM¿s Remedial Investigation / Feasibility Study Report (RI / FS Report), Shenango Steel Mold, Buffalo, New York, dated January 2002. The RI / FS Report indicates that the investigation encountered a surface layer of fill material, extending to depths ranging from 8 to 15 feet below ground surface (bgs). This fill layer consisted of a mixture of anthropomorphic materials of apparent industrial origin (fly ash, cinders, demolition debris, brick, ash, and slag), intermixed with fine to coarse sand and brown silty clay. A discontinuous layer of peat material was observed beneath the fill deposit at some locations. Natural overburden deposits beneath the fill layer reportedly consist of lacustrine deposits, consisting of blackbrown organic clayey silt and grey-brown slay / silty clay. Bedrock was encountered at depths ranging from 22 to 48 feet bgs. There are no surface water bodies on the subject property. The nearest significant surface water is the Union Canal, located approximately 200 feet west of the Site and connected to Lake Erie, which is located approximately one-half mile to the west of the site. The Buffalo River is located approximately one-and-a-half miles to the north of the site, flowing through the area in a meandering westerly direction before flowing into Lake Erie. A small pond (apparently for storm water retention) is present on the adjacent property to the north of the site.

Draft Investigation Work Plan for Brownfield Site Available for Public Comment

The public is invited to comment on a draft work plan being reviewed by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) to investigate the 1095 Niagara Street site ("site") located at 1095 Niagara Street, Buffalo, Erie County. Please see the map for the site location.

Draft Investigation Work Plan: The draft investigation work plan, called a "Remedial Investigation Work Plan," (RIWP) was submitted to NYSDEC under New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program. The investigation will be performed by 1095 Group, LLC ("applicant") with oversight by NYSDEC and the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH).

How to Comment: NYSDEC is accepting written comments about the Draft RIWP for 30 days, from March 31 through April 30, 2021.

Highlights of the Proposed Site Investigation: The investigation will define the nature and extent of contamination in soil, surface water, groundwater and any other parts of the environment that may be affected.

Previous investigations have detected volatile organic compounds (VOCs), mainly chlorinated solvents, in groundwater and semi-volatile organic compounds (SVOCs) and metals in soil on the site.

Key components of the investigation work include:

- Drilling and sampling soil borings to identify possible on-site sources of contamination;
- Installing and sampling five groundwater wells to monitor impacts from areas of concern both on-site and off-site; and
- Collecting three soil vapor samples to assess potential vapor intrusion risks in future buildings and adjoining offsite buildings.

Next Steps: NYSDEC will consider public comments, revise the plan as necessary, and approve the work plan. NYSDOH must concur with the plan. After the work plan is approved, the activities detailed in the work plan will be implemented.

When the investigation is completed, a report will be prepared and submitted to NYSDEC that summarizes the results. NYSDEC will review the report, make any necessary revisions and, if appropriate, approve the report.

After the investigation, a proposed cleanup plan, called a "Draft Remedial Work Plan" will be developed. The cleanup plan will include an evaluation of the proposed site remedy, or recommend a no action or no further action alternative. The goal of the cleanup plan is to ensure the protection of public health and the environment. NYSDEC will present the proposed cleanup plan to the public for its review and comment during a 45-day comment period.

NYSDEC will keep the public informed throughout the investigation and cleanup of the site.

Site Description: The site is 0.94-acres in area and is bordered by Niagara Street to the west, Albany Street to the south, commercial property to the north and commercial and residential properties to the east. The site currently consists of a gravel covered parking lot with landscaped berms and decorative fencing along Niagara and Albany Streets. Previously, the site contained a brick commercial building that had been used as a metal foundry from 1905 to 1936, and as a metal plating facility from 1936 until it was demolished in 2007.

Draft Remedial Investigation/Alternatives Analysis Report: The RI/AAR describes the results of the site investigation and recommends development of a remedy to address the contamination that was found at the site. The proposed restricted use remedy was developed by Barcalo Buffalo, LLC ("applicant") after performing a detailed investigation of the site under New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP). The proposed Restricted Use remedy consists of:

- Excavation and off-site disposal of grossly contaminated fill and metalsimpacted soil/fill exceeding Restricted-Residential Soil Cleanup Objectives or Site-Specific Action Levels (SSALs);
- Managing impacted water during remedial activities;

The metals and PAHs are present at depths up to five feet below grade and are likely the result of past site uses and historic fill present throughout the site. Naturally occurring metals including iron, magnesium, manganese and sodium were detected in groundwater above groundwater quality

standards. Sub-slab vapor sampling in the building detected the presence of chlorinated solvents trichloroethene, tetrachloroethene and dichloroethane above the NYSDOH guidance values.

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

Remedy Proposed for Brownfield Site Contamination; Public Comment Period Announced

The public is invited to comment on a proposed remedy being reviewed by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH), to address contamination related to the Former Pilgrim Village Family Apartments site ("site") located at 1100 Michigan Avenue, Buffalo, Erie County. Please see the map for the site location.

Based on the findings of the investigation, NYSDEC in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) has determined that the site does not pose a significant threat to public health or the environment. This decision is based on the nature of the existing contaminants identified at the site.

How to Comment: NYSDEC is accepting written comments about the proposed plan, called a "Draft Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP)" for 45 days, from March 24 through May 7, 2021.

Draft Remedial Work Plan: The proposed Unrestricted Use remedy consists of:

 Excavation and off-site disposal of contaminated soil/fill from approximately five feet below surface grade across the entire site;

 Collecting and analyzing end-point soil samples and post-remedial groundwater samples to evaluate the effectiveness of the remedy;

• Groundwater treatment and monitoring in the former gas station area;

 Removal of three existing apartment buildings and foundations. The buildings will not be occupied during implementation of the remedy;

• Importing clean material that meets the established Soil Cleanup Objectives for use as backfill;

 Implementing a Health and Safety Plan and Community Air Monitoring Plan during all ground intrusive activities; and

 If an Unrestricted Use cleanup is not achieved, recording of an Environmental Easement to ensure proper use of the site may be required.

The proposed remedy was developed by SAA EVI MC Family, LLC ("applicant") after performing a detailed investigation of the site under New York's Brownfield Program (BCP). A "Remedial Investigation/Alternatives Analysis Report (RI/AAR) which describes the results of the site investigation was submitted concurrently with the Remedial Action Work Plan and is also available for review at the locations identified on Page 1.

Next Steps: NYSDEC will consider public comments, revise the cleanup plan as necessary, and issue a final Decision Document. NYSDOH must concur with the proposed remedy. After approval, the proposed remedy becomes the selected remedy. The applicant may then design and perform the cleanup action to address the site contamination, with oversight by NYSDEC and NYSDOH.

NYSDEC will keep the public informed throughout the investigation and cleanup of the site.

Site Description: The Former Pilgrim Village Family Apartments site is an approximately 2.55-acre site located in a mixed commercial/residential area at the southwest corner of Michigan Avenue and Best Street in the City of Buffalo. The site includes three clusters of multiple-unit apartment buildings with a total of 17 units. The site also includes green space and asphalt parking areas. Planned development at the site is construction of new apartment buildings.

Summary of the Investigation: The primary contaminants of concern at the site are metals, polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) and petroleum-related volatile organic compounds (VOCs). Metals and PAHs are present site-wide in soil/fill. VOCs are present in soil and groundwater in an area of the site which formerly operated as a gas station.

Brownfield Cleanup Program: New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) encourages the voluntary cleanup of contaminated properties known as "brownfields" so that they can be reused and redeveloped. These uses may include recreation, housing, business or other uses. A brownfield site is any real property where a contaminant is present at levels exceeding the soil cleanup objectives or other health-based or environmental standards, criteria or guidance adopted by DEC that are applicable based on the reasonably anticipated use of the property, in accordance with applicable regulations.

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Site Location
